The Council strongly advises that anyone thinking of getting a pet should have a good knowledge and/or take professional advice on the care of such animals before getting the pet. It is a licence condition of pet shops within the District, that pet care leaflets or other similar written instructions must be made available to customers free of charge at the time of purchase and that proper advice on the care of the animal must be given. Once the pet has been acquired, responsible pet ownership should include means of identifying the owner of the animal (e.g. micro-chipping), health checks, including vaccinations, where required and the safe and hygienic disposal of all animal waste.	To encourage pet owners to act responsibly and properly control their animals whilst they are in any area used by other members of the public or where there are other animals.	Add new paragraph: Pet owners are encouraged to properly control their animals to avoid the possibility of them causing annoyance or distress to members of the public or to other animals.
