Pigeon Culls - including cage trapping, use of narcotic baits and removing pigeon eggs from nests	<ul> <li>Immediate reduction in pigeon population (depending on method used)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>No long term reduction in pigeon population</li> <li>Area will be repopulated by pigeons from nearby areas within a short space of time</li> <li>Expensive</li> <li>Public opposition</li> <li>Difficult to trap / kill pigeons in public areas</li> </ul>
