# ROCHFORD DISTRICT COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

#### 1 SUMMARY

1.1 This report provides Members with details of the function of the joint Castle Point and Rochford District Community Safety Partnership and an update of the achievements of the Partnership (CSP) since the last Review Committee on 09 October 2012.

#### 2 INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 Each CSP under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 has a statutory requirement to produce a Strategic Assessment and three year Partnership Plan (2013-2015), reviewed annually. The purpose of the partnership, in conducting a Strategic Assessment, which includes the analysis of crime and disorder, is to improve understanding of local problems and their potential causes and to respond more effectively to the communities we serve by setting clear and robust priorities.
- 2.2 A Local Policing Area (LPA) South Strategic Assessment 2013/2014 has been produced to reflect changing priorities identified across Rochford, Castle Point, Basildon and Southend. Local Policing Area Strategic Assessments have been produced for LPA West and LPA North. An overarching Essex Strategic Assessment (SA) summarises the three LPA SAs and reflects the crime, disorder and community safety issues that have been identified across Essex.
- 2.3 2013/2014 CSP Strategic priorities have been identified and collaborative LPA SAs produced in January 2013 to inform the production and consultation on the PCCs Police and Crime Plan, which sets the police and crime objectives for the county and the setting of the annual force budget and police precept in February 2013.

## 3 STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND FUNDING

3.1 The Strategic Assessment 2013/2014 process has provided Castle Point (CP) and Rochford District (RD) CSP with the knowledge and understanding of the crime, disorder and community safety issues that have been indentified across both Districts as our priorities for consideration. These priorities have been approved by the joint CSP Steering Group on 24 January and have been forwarded for ratification by the Joint Local Strategic Partnership (LSP) Executive on 21 March. Local reduction targets against each of these priorities will be determined by the joint CSP by 31 March. The CP and RD CSP will concentrate on the following 5 priorities for 2013/2014 (financial year April to March):-

- Reduce anti-social behaviour Identifying and supporting repeat and vulnerable victims, improving perceptions and facilitating local problem solving to address issues.
- Reduce serious acquisitive crime With clear emphasis on burglary dwellings and theft from motor vehicles and emerging trends.
- Reduce acquisitive crime With a clear emphasis on shoplifting and burglary other and emerging trends.
- Reducing Domestic Abuse With an emphasis on reducing the number of repeat victims, reducing the number of sexual offences, delivering healthy relationships and personal safety awareness and reducing alcohol related disorder.

**Integrated Offender Management (IOM)** – reducing crime and reoffending, is a statutory responsibility of CSPs.

- 3.2 A CSP action plan is being developed, based on the priorities, and the actions that arise from it will be monitored throughout the year.
- 3.3 Performance against 2012/2013 priorities from 01 April to 30 November indicates:-

## 40.78% (831 recorded crimes) increase in All Crime

For the same period in 2011, 36,000 crimes were recorded for Essex (including the two unitary authorities). In 2012, 54,834 crimes were recorded, an increase of 52% (18,834 crimes). This is in line with the national trend given the current financial climate. However, Rochford District has the lowest All Crime rate for the whole county when compared per 1,000 population.

#### 1.38% (15 incidents) increase in anti-social behaviour

Rochford District is the lowest in the whole county for incident report rate of ASB when compared per 1,000 population

#### 5.90% (11 repeat victims) reduction in repeat victims of domestic abuse

#### 3.9% (6 recorded crimes) increase in domestic burglary

The CSP Action Plan (attached as Appendix 1) details performance against priorities.

3.4 Police and Crime Commissioners in each police force area have the power to approve mergers of Community Safety Partnerships. Castle Point CSP and Rochford District CSP have been operating as an informally merged partnership since the legislation for the Home Secretary to formally approve CSP mergers was withdrawn. The CSPs Have now requested the PCC to approve a formal merger of the two partnerships.

- 3.5 Essex Police Basic Command Unit funding, which was previously allocated to Castle Point and Rochford District CSPs to support joint activities ceases on 31 March 2013. From April 2013/2014 Police and Crime Commissioners will have control of all central government funding which goes to Community Safety Partnerships. The PCC will have the power to commission community safety work from a range of local partners including, but not limited to CSPs. Funding for CSPs to support community safety work will be determined by the PCC in March 2013.
- 3.6 Castle Point and Rochford District CSP successfully secured funding from Safer Essex to commission Southend MIND to deliver tailored basic mental health awareness training to frontline community safety staff pan Essex. Two workshops have been delivered and evaluated and the final workshop will be delivered in February 2013.
- 3.7 Primary Care Trusts are currently responsible authorities on Community Safety Partnerships. On 01 April 2013 Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs), under Schedule 5, Paragraph 84 of the Health and Social Care Act 2012 will replace Primary Care Trusts, and become responsible authorities on Community Safety Partnerships.
- 3.8 Essex Police and Crime Panel (PCP) ceased in shadow form upon the election of the Police and Crime Commissioner in November 2012. The Panel which has met four times includes an elected Councillor from each council in the force area and a County Councillor. The PCP Terms of Reference were ratified by Full Council 23 October 2012. The Panel will start to review the PCCs draft Police and Crime Plan and proposed police precept at its meeting on 31 January 2013.
- 3.9 Two Police and Crime Commissioner public engagement events involving CSP members, local police and local residents will be scheduled to take place in Rochford District during 2013/2014.
- 3.10 The Essex Police/CSP Media and Communications Co-ordinator post funded from the Basic Command Unit and shared with Castle Point will be withdrawn as part of the Essex Police Blueprint on 31 March 2013. RDC Community Safety Team and RDC Communications Team will work collaboratively to produce CSP media releases.
- 3.11 The Domestic Abuse Reduction Officer post in the Community Safety Team, which is full-time, one year fixed term contract until May, will be extended for a further 12 months. The post is currently part funded from the Community Safety Team Crime and Disorder Reserve and part funded from income generated from the ESAB Domestic Abuse workshops. A tender was submitted to Essex Safeguarding Adults Board in December 2012 to deliver Basic, Enhanced and DASH Domestic Abuse Awareness training workshops across Essex from April 2013. ESAB will inform the organisation which has been awarded the contract in March 2013.

## 4 RECOMMENDATION
