ESSEX ESTUARIES MARINE SITE

1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1. To alert Members to new statutory duties imposed on relevant authorities in respect of the above and to seek the necessary funding required to fulfil the Council's obligations.

2 RESPONSIBILITIES OF RELEVANT AUTHORITIES

- 2.1. The letter shown at Appendix 1 of this report sets out the detail of the actions which are required as a result of the coastal area from Jaywick to Shoeburyness being designated as the Essex Estuaries European Marine Site.
- 2.2. The letter indicates that, if relevant authorities do not comply with the duties placed upon them the Secretary of State has powers to direct them to do so. If Rochford is to participate in this initiative it should be on the basis that all of the other relevant authorities also make an appropriate contribution.
- 2.3 As may be seen from the attached letter, a number of authorities are giving assistance in kind. Given the current demands on staff time, this is not regarded as an appropriate course of action for Rochford. The most cost effective solution would be to make a financial contribution.

3 ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1. Proper management of the coastline is of major ecological importance to the District.

4 RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

- 4.1. A provision would need to be made in the draft revenue budget in the sum of £4,000 per annum for a period of three years.
- 4.2 There is also an element of officer resource in supplying relevant information and attending meetings.

5 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

5.1. This is a statutory duty placed upon relevant authorities.

7 RECOMMENDATION

It is proposed that the Committee RESOLVES

- (1) To agree that the authority should make an appropriate contribution for a three-year period subject to the other relevant authorities making a similar commitment.
- (2) To request the Finance & General Purposes Committee to make provision in draft revenue estimates of £4,000. (CD(F&ES))



The Essex Estuaries European Marine Site, which stretches from Jaywick to Shoeburyness and includes 300 square kilometres of inshore waters, has been established in response to the Habitats Directive and to the Habitats Regulations (1994). The regulations set out new statutory duties for Relevant Authorities for marine sites, regarding the use of their existing powers to safeguard the conservation status of the site. Your organisation is one of the 14 relevant authorities for this site.

I am writing to ask you to make provision within your forthcoming budgeting round for a contribution towards the core costs of the Essax Estuaries Initiative as set out in the attached paper. Where contributions are already made (or where in kind contributions are requested) a statement of commitment to continued support will be welcomed. I am sure that you will agree that these funding arrangements should be time limited and suggest that they be limited to three years (with a review after two years).

The Regulations make provision for the Relevant Authorities to come together in a Management Group and to jointly develop a Scheme of Management (which will be a statutory document). The Secretary of State has powers to direct authorities to do this if necessary. There is no doubt that the Essex Estuaries site is of sufficient complexity in the management issues it faces that such power would be exercised by the Secretary of State to ensure that the UK's European obligations are met.

The development of the Management Scheme will be a complex task, and its implementation will involve long-term processes. The co-ordination of this work is an essential and considerable task in itself and has (up to now) been paid for jointly by Colchester Borough Council, Tendring District Council and English Nature through the employment of an estuary officer for the Colne, who is also responsible for facilitating and co-ordinating the development of the management scheme. funding arrangements for this post will be reviewed in May 2001, and as yet there has been no budget identified for implementation of the Management Scheme. This is because there is no Government funding specifically for this work (and it is unclear what implementation will involve), and because there is a low level of awareness amongst relevant authorities of the need to develop a management scheme.

The Management Scheme will guide all of the relevant authorities with respect to their duties under the Habitats Regulations, and may also identify financial and other benefits through improved liaison, co-ordination and joint working. In order to currie that the Management Scheme is progressed in accordance with the Regulations, it is crucial that all Relevant Authorities contribute to the costs of developing the Management Scheme, through the provision of core funding or core services. Other large European Marine Siles (e.g. the Wash, the Solent, Morecombe Bay, North Northamberland Coast) have two officers working on this task.

I would be grateful if you could confirm that bids for funds will be made. Please also provide confect details of the member of staff dealing with this issue.

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Projected annual core costs for the development and the implementation of a Scheme of management

The following cost summary outlines the expected annual core costs for the development and implementation of the Scheme of Management for the Essex Estuaries European Marine Site. Note that the two posts referred to are partiting with regard to this work. It is hoped that the federated approach agreed by the management group, which builds on existing processes, will secure the viability of this approach. Elsewhere in the country more staff have been necessary.

Summary of funding requested from Relevant Authorities

There are a variety of factors to take into account in allocating this cost between relevant authorities;

- some authorities are already contributing to co-ordination between relevant authorities through existing initiatives (e.g. Blackwater Plan)
- the implications of the management of the site are clearly different for each Relevant Authority

 – for some the implications are marginal, and for some they may be much greater
- . there are differing abilities to contribute amongst the Relevant Authorities

Individual requests are being made, therefore, for resources. These are summarised below:
