

We should at this point declare our interest in the Public Entertainment Licence request made by the landlord of the above Public House; we are neighbours.

We have lived next door to the Anchor since Christmas 1985 and have never before found the need to make any complaint whatsoever to any of the landlords until the recent incumbent. Since the new landlord arrived we are suffering an increasing level of noise disturbance never previously experienced. Given that we live next door and indeed continue to frequent the pub, we understand that extra noise on special occasions might be forgiven. Now, however, we cannot sit in our garden without the pervasive deep bass tones of the 'background' music engulfing every weekend and weekday evening.

We are aware that they have recently taken their Karaoke session off the menu on Sunday afternoons, presumably in order to prepare to go legal! But the problem persists in that they insist on throwing all their doors and windows open and playing background music unbelievably loud. What chance are we to have to enjoy village life when the desire of the current management appear to be to produce a 'London Pub' in our midst?

Please understand that as a local businesswoman I understand and subscribe to the notion that entrepreneurs should be encouraged. It may be that due to inexperience, the Anchor licensee believes that their approach will bring long-term success. I offer no criticism if they wish to change the character of the pub, it's their prerogative, but not at the expense of our and other neighbours' rights.

Great Wakering; after a long decline, appears to be improving. One can see many properties both modest and more substantial being proudly renovated thus enhancing the aesthetic of the High Street to the benefit of all. The local Church, just a hundred yards from the Anchor, raised thousands of pounds from locals in order to have the Church professionally floodlit for the benefit of all. The council has made efforts with its traffic control and pavement repairs also to the benefit of all locals and now we see right on the edge of the conservation area a severe threat to the local community.

The lack of care and control over the trading areas is abhorrent. Sitting in our kitchen or lying in bed one can hear the cacophony of noise. Surely we cannot be expected to put up with what we get now let alone after a licence is granted. This area is a conservation area. Behind us in the Anchorage are residents one couple of which are now too embarrassed to invite friends to visit because of the noise; another a widow who retired to her dream bungalow is now forced into considering selling up.

This has now become a very serious matter; we have been patient for far too long already, but enough is enough. Consideration must be given to local residents; if the Entertainment Licence is granted it will be in the face of reasonable, neighbourly and quite frankly good sense.


