
ROCHFORD DISTRICT COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

1 SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report provides Members with details of the function of the joint Castle Point and Rochford District Community Safety Partnership (CP & RDCSP) and an update of the achievements of the Partnership since the last report into Review Committee on 3 September 2013.

2 INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 Each CSP under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 has a statutory requirement to produce a Strategic Assessment and three year Partnership Plan (2014-2016), reviewed annually. The purpose of the partnership in conducting a Strategic Assessment, which includes the analysis of crime and disorder, is to improve understanding of local problems and their potential causes and to respond more effectively to the communities we serve by setting clear and robust priorities.
- 2.2 The first joint Castle Point and Rochford District Strategic Assessment 2014/2015 is being completed and an accompanying annual Partnership Plan will be produced by March to reflect changing priorities identified across Rochford and Castle Point Districts. A joint CSP Action Plan will be developed that robustly performance monitors projects and activity that relates to the CSP priorities.
- 2.3 Each CSPs Strategic Assessment is used to inform the production of and consultation on the PCCs Police and Crime Plan, which sets the police and crime objectives for the county and the setting of the annual force budget and police precept in February 2014.

3 STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND FUNDING

- 3.1 The CP and RD CSP priorities for 2014/2015 (financial year April to March) are:-
- **Reduce anti-social behaviour** – Identifying and supporting repeat and vulnerable victims, improving perceptions and facilitating local problem solving to address issues.
 - **Reduce the number of dwelling burglaries** – Including reducing the risk of becoming a repeat victim.
 - **Reducing Domestic Abuse** – With an emphasis on reducing the number of repeat victims
 - **Integrated Offender Management (IOM)** – Reducing crime and reoffending, is a statutory responsibility of CSPs.

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- 3.2 Police and Crime Commissioners have control of all Central Government funding which goes to Community Safety Partnerships. For 2014/2015 the PCC has agreed to allocate separate grants of £13,000 to Rochford District CSP and Castle Point CSP, the same amount awarded to each of the CSPs for 2013/2014. The PCC has introduced a change to the funding terms and conditions for 2014/2015 with only £6500 (50%) of the funding being received automatically, the remaining £6500 (50%) on a commissioning basis. This commissioned funding will be awarded on submission of action plans evidencing key milestones, outputs and measurable outcomes. The plans need to demonstrate how they will address local priorities and assist the Police and Crime Commissioner in achieving his wider community safety priorities. The funding will be amalgamated to address the CSP priorities and support community safety work across the two areas.
- 3.3 The PCC has indicated that funding arrangements for CSPs in 2015/2016 will change. It is likely that CSPs will automatically receive 25% funding with the remaining 75% on a commissioned basis. The amount of funding awarded to each CSP may also vary and a meeting with the PCC office to discuss future CSP funding will be scheduled at a later date.
- 3.4 The PCC launched a New Initiative Fund (NIF) of £500,000 in April 2013 to provide partnerships and organisations the opportunity to apply for funding for projects, services or activities which contribute towards the priority areas set out in the Police and Crime Plan. Rochford District has benefitted from £16,653 NIF and includes funding for Castle Point and Rochford CVS for a Befriending Service across both areas and Wakering Young Peoples Community Project for activities for young people during school holidays. Further applications totalling £61,400 have been submitted but have been unsuccessful.
- 3.5 A Community Messaging Scheme funded by the Police and Crime Commissioner and Proceeds of Crime Act (POCA) is to be introduced across the whole of Essex and would provide an alert system across the whole of the County to highlight specific crime related issues.
- 3.6 The CSP has assigned £11,700 of Rochford Districts' 2013/2014 allocation of £13,000 to address the CSPs key strategic priorities. Projects/initiatives funded by the CSP include Outreach work for victims of Domestic Violence, Cut Out Cops for Operation Pepper to tackle shoplifting, Mediation for resolving neighbour disputes and a partnership initiative involving Essex Police, RRAVS and NHW to reduce the number of dwelling burglaries. The remaining £1,300 allocated to tackle Domestic Abuse will be spent by 31 March 2014.
- 3.7 Performance against 2013/2014 priorities from 01 April 2013 to 31 December 2013 indicates:-

0% change in All Crime

For the period 01 April 2013 to 31 December 2013 there were 2123 crimes recorded for the Rochford District, the same number of crimes recorded for the same period in 2012. All Crime solved rate of 26.1% means that Rochford is 1.8% better than the same period last year.

1% reduction (12 incidents) in Anti-Social Behaviour

1247 incidents of anti-social behaviour have been recorded for the period 01 April 2013 to 31 December 2013 compared with 1259 incidents for the same period in 2012.

Repeat victims of Domestic Abuse

Due to recent changes in the recording of Repeat Victims of Domestic Violence by Essex Police, figures for Rochford District are currently unavailable.

22.6% increase (38 crimes) in Burglary Dwelling

For the period 01 April 2013 to 31 December 2013 there were 206 offences of burglary dwelling recorded compared with 168 for the same period in 2012. Essex Police County Wide 'Operation Insight' launched in 2013 is still continuing.

21% reduction (35 crimes) in Burglary (Other)

131 crimes of Burglary (Other) were recorded for the period 01 April 2013 to 31 December 2013. This is a reduction of 35 crimes from 2012.

8% increase (15 crimes) in Shoplifting

There were 196 offences recorded by Police for the period 01 April 2013 to 31 December 2013 compared with 181 for the same period in 2012. Operation Pepper and the Retail Action Panel launched in 2013 are continuing. Increased communication and increased confidence in reporting with local retailers is a contributory factor to an increase in reporting. The Police detection rate for shoplifting offences is 22.5 % in 2013.

12% increase (24 crimes) Theft From Motor Vehicle (TFMV)

The number of recorded crimes against vehicles across Essex has increased overall.

Rochford District has seen a slight increase in vehicle crime of 12% for the period 01 April 2013 to 31 December 2013 compared with the same period last year. In 2013 there were 220 Thefts From Motor Vehicles recorded compared with 196 crimes in 2012.

The CSP Action Plan (attached as Appendix 1) details performance against priorities.

- 3.8 A formal offer has been made to an external candidate for post of the Domestic Abuse Reduction Officer based in the Community Safety Team, with the person due to take up her new role in April 2014.
- 3.9 The post of Assistant Community Safety Officer based within the Community Safety Team is currently vacant. The previous officer took up a new role within the Council on 30 December. A staffing requirement form has been submitted to SMT requesting recruitment to the post.
- 3.10 Rochford District CSP has arranged its third Community Older Persons Event (COPE) on Wednesday 19 March from 10:45am to 4:00pm at Stambridge Memorial Hall, Stambridge. The event is designed for older residents who live in the District and includes a number of different stalls and presentations from a variety of organisations and agencies offering help and advice on staying safe. Previous successful events were held in Ashingdon in May 2013 and Hullbridge in October 2013. Details of the event have been distributed across the district.
- 3.11 The 2014 Police and Crime Commissioner public engagement event involving CSP members, local police and local residents will be taking place on Thursday 13 March, 6pm until 8pm at Hockley Primary School, Chevening Gardens, Hockley SS5 4RU . Residents and businesses will have the opportunity to discuss crime and policing issues with the PCC.
- 3.12 The Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Bill 2013-2014 was announced on 08 May 2013. The bill is currently in the House of Lords at Report Stage and a second day was held on 14 January 2014. A third day of Report Stage is scheduled for 20 January 2014. A number of changes in legislation are being proposed including the use of injunctions, Criminal Behaviour Orders, Dispersal Powers, Community Protection Notices and Public Spaces Protection Orders. Members will receive Training on the new ASB legislative changes during 2014.
